Annual Report Lincoln City Libraries September 1, 2017 – August 31, 2018

Learning, Literacy and Literature remain the values at the core of Lincoln City Libraries.

The 2017-2018 reporting year saw continued progress in ongoing community campaigns that build up lifelong education and community success, as well as new initiatives to benefit our community.

The library continues to take seriously its responsibility to prepare children for school. "15 Minutes a Day" is our program to encourage people to read aloud to preschool children. Activities in support of "15 Minutes a Day" included partnerships with medical homes funded through the Lincoln Community Foundation and Lincoln Lancaster County Health Department.

The library builds its technology to serve our community. The Jane Pope Geske Heritage Room of Nebraska Authors partnered with UNL's Center for Digital Research in the Humanities to create NebraskaAuthors.org, an online information resource about Nebraska authors. This unique resource builds on the resources of the Heritage Room to make this information available worldwide.

Libraries collaborate with a wide variety of partners. A sampling of this year's partners includes the YWCA, Prosper Lincoln, the Lincoln Children's Museum, Humanities Nebraska, History Nebraska, the Lincoln Saltdogs, the Lincoln Ukulele Group, UNL, Nebraska Urban Indian Health Center, the Asian Community and Cultural Center, El Centro de las Americas, the Malone Center, CenterPointe, and the Center for People in Need.

The library participates in distinctive community events, some of them online. Lincoln City Libraries (LCL) participated in the Winter Reading Challenge, a national promotion by Beanstack, a library special event software. Mark Cuban, billionaire star of the television program Shark Tank, pledged significant donations to libraries and literacy programs if certain goals were met nationwide. The Lincoln total exceeded 1.5 million minutes, far exceeding our original goal of 100,000 minutes. Lincoln earned \$1500 for its top five finish.

Among our community's favorite summer events is our collaboration with other City departments to invite children to get up close and personal with heavy machinery. Walt Branch Manager Jodene Glaesemann reported, "LCL collaborated with Parks and Recreation, Public Works, and Lincoln Fire and Rescue to provide a heavy equipment morning on the Walt Branch parking lot. Officer Chassidy Jackson-Goodwin, known to many in Lincoln from her Crime Stoppers reports, was present as well. Five hundred attended this event with families parking at the YMCA and Densmore Park, walking to the library, and then waiting as long as an hour to sit in the fire truck. We were fortunate it was a cool, good weather day!" This event was presented at several branch libraries as part of the Summer Reading Program.

The Library Board continued planning for a new downtown Central Library and branch library improvements. President Herb Friedman completed his seven-year term. The City Council appointed Dan Sloan to fill his seat.

Lincoln's libraries reflect trends seen nationwide. Libraries are creating spaces that support all kinds of uses. Less space is allocated for shelves of materials, and more space to tables, chairs, and collaborative spaces. Events from toddler storytimes to music-and-movement activities to Makerspace activities to the One Book - One Lincoln Community Reading program, draw people into the library to learn in community.

The library's strategic plan reflects the community's interest in building on its success, ensuring that its children succeed in school and life, and addressing the needs of people struggling to make ends meet. Through Learning, Literacy, and Literature, the libraries contribute to our community.




